LEASE RENEWAL 2011 – Preparation is the Key!

The month of April is the beginning of the lease renewal process for Parks leaseholders. The new lease period will begin August 1, 2011 and ends July 31, 2012.

Leaseholders will receive a lease renewal notification email from Student Housing at the beginning of April and are expected to express interest in renewing their lease by using the online form available on the Housing Channel through MyUCDavis.

Submitting online interest information does not mean that your lease has automatically been renewed. Housing staff will review eligibility status based on student status, conduct, lease violations, and current rent status. Once eligibility has been approved, an email will be sent asking leaseholders to review the new lease, complete required information, and submit an electronic signature to

accept the new lease terms and conditions. It is very important to: Review SISWEB [http://sisweb.ucdavis.edu/] records to ensure that two emergency contacts are listed in the system. Verify address & contact information is current, including cell phone numbers. This information is necessary to complete the online renewal process.

Leaseholders planning to vacate should use the Renewal Survey to confirm that they will not renew their lease. Any resident electing not to renew their lease is required to submit a vacate notice at the Park Office by June 20, 2011. Park Office staff will provide important vacate instructions once the notice is processed. Please be advised that failure to renew your lease or submit a vacate notice will result in a 42 day notice of termination of tenancy. Any requests

for exceptions to the above-mentioned procedures should be sent to Joann Wilson, Residential Services Manager-joannwilson@ucdavis.edu

During the months of May, June, and July, leaseholders will not be allowed to defer their rent. Leaseholders whose monthly rent is in arrears will not be eligible for lease renewal. If you have questions regarding your housing payment, please call Residential Student Accounts [752-2481].

All leaseholders should review the following sections of their leases: Section 6- Eligibility Section 7- Lease Renewal.

Learn more about the environment. Earth Day is a good time to make a commitment to learning more about the environment and how you can help to protect it. Borrow some library books and read up on an issue such as pollution, endangered species, water shortages, recycling, and climate change. Or, learn about a region you've never considered before, like the Arctic, the deserts, or the rainforests. This is a good opportunity if you have not done so yet to check out the new children's center at the Davis Public Library, so much fun!

Ride your bike. Now that spring is upon us, take advantage of the fantastic and expansive Davis bike trails to; get your exercise, run small errands, commute to work, or just spend some quality time with your family. Human powered transportation is awesome!

Reduce, reuse and recycle all day long. Buy as little as possible and avoid items that come in lots of packaging. Support local growers and producers of food and products - these don't have to travel as far and so reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Take your drink container with you, and don't use any disposable plates or cutlery. Recycle all the things you do use for the day or find other uses for things that you no longer use. Carry a cloth bag for carrying things in and recycle your plastic bags.

Spring Cleaning Now is the time to clear out the winter cobwebs and get rid of all those things you no longer use. Donate your unwanted, but still good items, to a

resale shop, the Salvation Army or other charity. Your home, your conscious and the earth will be cleaner for it.

Get children to recycle their old toys and games. We all know that space is a valuable commodity in the Parks, make some more room by giving away old toys and games to younger children who could make use of them. Older children learn two lessons: One is about giving to others and the second is about reusing and recycling instead of throwing things away. Adults can also do this with clothes, electrical items, books and more. Learn about product exchange communities like Freecycle and other alternatives.

Make nature crafts. Get together with your family and build a birdhouse or make a bird feeder to encourage the local bird population, which plays an important role in every ecosystem. Use objects that would've otherwise been thrown away to create beautiful works of art. See what ideas you can come up with!

Rid litter. Rid litter from our roadways. Many groups use the weekend of Earth Day to clear roadways, highways and neighborhood streets of litter that has accumulated since the last clean-up day. Many companies donate gloves and bags for clean-up groups.

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Once the group has collected the trash and placed the recycled bags along the road, get the village public works department to pick the bags up. It's a and wonderful community project.

Hold an Earth Day fair.

Maybe your school, your street, your local neighborhood is interested in getting together to have an environmental fair. Things to have at the fair include demonstrations of environmentally-friendly products, children's artwork, healthy/locally grown foods to eat, animal care demonstrations (including wildlife rescue), games for the children made of recycled products, musicians and actors performing

environmental music and skits, stalls which are recycling unwanted treasures and books, local environmental organizations presenting their issues and wares. Money raised can go towards a local environmental restoration project or to an environmental group agreed upon by all the participants running the fair.

Wear green and/or brown.

Dress in environmental colors for the day; think "tree"! Wear badges if you have them that carry pithy summaries of your environmental views.

Engage others in conversations about your environmental concerns. Don't be bossy or pushy, just tell people some facts and then explain your

feelings about them. Encourage them to respond and if they have no opinions or they seem to not know much, help them learn some more by imparting your environmental knowledge in a friendly and helpful manner.

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Cook a special Earth Day meal. Plan a menu that uses locally produced foods, is healthy and has minimal impact on the environment. Favor vegetable and bean products, as these use less resources to grow than mass-farmed meat. If you still would like meat, look for locally produced, organic meat. Try and have organic food completely. Decorate the table with recycled decorations made by you and your friends.

The History of Easter Egg Coloring

The decoration of Easter eggs to further enhance their value became an art form centuries ago and continues today. Dyes made from vegetables, edible flowers, fruits, coffee, tea, leaves, bark, and roots were used to tint the eggs. Lovely designs were created by wrapping the eggs in ferns before tinting. The art progressed, with western Europeans becoming expert at creating intricate patterns in vibrant colors on the small eggs.

Always be certain you use food-

safe dyes when coloring eggs that will be eaten. Here are explanations of some of the many types of decorated eggs:

- Etched: Traced back to Macedonia, this process involves dying the egg, applying a layer of wax in a design, then bleaching off the color leaving only the wax-covered areas with color.
- Krashanky: The Ukrainian word means color, and these eggs are dyed a solid, brilliant color, often red to

- symbolize the blood shed by Christ on the cross.
- Pysanky: The term comes from the word pysaty, meaning to write, and this describes how the egg is decorated. Intricate designs are drawn in wax on the eggs, a process closely related to batik. The eggs are then dyed many colors. Ukrainian artisans are famous for their pysanky.

- Fabergé: Probably some of the most famous and most expensive Easter eggs known are those created by Russian jeweler Peter Carl Fabergé in the 1800's. The eggs were made of gold, silver and jewels and most opened up to exquisite tiny figures of people, animals, plants or buildings. A total of 57 eggs were made. These are obviously museum artifacts of high value.
- Binsegraas: The Pennsylvania Dutch traditionally wrapped the pith of the binsegraas, a type

- of rush, in coils which were glued to eggs. Then interestingly-shaped scraps of calico cloth were pasted on the egg. The Polish use colorful rug yarn formed into elaborately-designed coils, although they, too, originally used rushes.
- Jeweled: Designs are created by gluing any manner of sequins, beads, flowers, etc., onto blown eggs.
- Cut-Out or Carved: Blown eggs are used also for these creations where a portion of the shell is cut away. The

exterior is decorated, and the inside filled with a little scene to be viewed through the cut-out section. These can be exquisitely elaborate. Page 5

➤ Calico or Madras: Eggs were wrapped in calico or madras cloth and then boiled. The water released the dyes from the cloth and transferred to the egg. Since most modern cloth is colorfast, these are rarely made nowadays. This type of egg is not to be eaten, due to the danger of the dyes.

Monthly Maintenance Tips

By Orchard and Solano Park Maintenance

- To avoid plumbing charges, watch those kitchen drains. Make sure your strainer is in place in the drain to keep food from going down and plugging the drain.
- Never put grease or oil or any kind down the drain as it will clog the pipes. Put your grease or oil into a can or bottle while it is will warm. When it has cooled
- off, place it in the trash.
 Are your closet doors often coming untracked? Take
 - care of them by sliding the closet doors slowly and straight.
- Remember that bedroom and cabinet doors are not painted surfaces. Hanging items with tape, nails, or tacks will harm the wood finish. Damage charges
- could e assessed when you vacate your apartment.
- Periodically cleaning the refrigerator door seal will make it easier to open and keep it from ripping. Take special care to clean the bottom edge with warm soapy water where sticky liquids like to accumulate.

Holidays and Anniversaries

April 2 - International Children's Book Day

Celebrated on the birth date of the world-famous Danish writer and storyteller, Hans Christian Andersen. This is the day when children's literature is recognized and celebrated.

April 5 - Qing Ming Festival, National Tomb Sweeping Day [Taiwan]

The Chinese equivalent of "All Souls Day" where food and incense are offered to one's ancestors. According to Chinese custom, the tombs of ancestors are swept "clear and bright" on this day, and rites honoring ancestors are held.

April 13 - Songkran, Water Festival [Thailand]

Songkran is a Buddhist New Year that is celebrated 13 April and lasts for three days. During this festival, everyone carries buckets or bowls of water with them so they can throw water on one another. The Thai people believe there is great merit in acts of kindness, so before the holiday, children buy birds in order to set them free on Songkran. Also, girls in gay

dresses carry fish and set them free in the river. A water festival queen is chosen and paraded along the streets with bands playing amid laughter and the sound of splashing water

April 15 - Birth of Guru Nanak [Sikh]

Observes the birth of the founder of the Sikh religion in 1469 and the first of the ten Gurus of the Sikh faith. There are ten gurus (male religious teachers and spiritual guides/leaders) in the Sikh religion, but Nanak, Teg Bahadur, and Gobind Sigh are the most important. The Holy Book of the Sikhs is called Guru Granth Sahib and is considered to be a guru itself. It was completed by the fifth guru, Guru Arian Dev in the early 1600s.

April 17 - Palm Sunday [Christian]

Commemorates Christ's last entry into Jerusalem, when his way was covered with palms by the multitudes. This day is the beginning of Holy Week in western Christian Churches.

April 21 - Kindergarten Day [U.S.A.]

A day to recognize the importance of play, games and "creative self-activity" in child education, and to note the history of the kindergarten; observed on the date of Fredrick Froebel's birth in 1782. Froebel established the first kindergarten in 1837, and this concept was brought to the United States by German immigrants in the 1840s. The first American public kindergarten was established in 1873, in St. Louis, Missouri.

April 22 - Earth Day [U.S.A.]

Observances of this day focus on environmental problems in communities throughout the US. It is also the day the world's nations guaranteed asylum to those persecuted in their homelands on account of their ethnicity, religion or political opinion. (1970)

Did you know?

Registration Reminder ~ Student Housing requires all students to meet our eligibility requirements to continue living in The Parks Apartments. Students must have full-time registered status during fall, winter and spring quarters/semesters. Full -time status is defined at 12 units for quarter students and 10 units for semester students. Students who do not meet the requirement are required to register for additional classes or submit notice to move out. Please

be aware of these requirements when you register for winter and spring quarters in the coming months. Please contact Student Housing at 752-2033 or your Park Office if you have any questions.

- Planning to vacate after finals? Remember a 42-day notice is required.
- Leaseholders are only allowed to have one adult, related or unrelated, listed on their lease
- If you wish to add someone to your lease, remember to

- submit an Online Occupant
 Change Request on the
 Student Housing Channel
 before the person moves in.
 Your request must be
 approved before your
 occupant can move in on the
 effective date of the request.
- Occupants on your lease are the only individuals who are allowed to obtain a key for your apartment and/or additional one day visitor parking permits.
- Only the leaseholder may request a copy of the lease agreement from the Park Office.
